

### WINNERS NEVER QUIT is back in the Marsh

Front Yard Airboat rebuild, the airboat is constructed using Hickman templates of a Palm Beach riveted open hull with side boards, hunt style metal works. The engine is a Lycoming Upstack I0540 Aircraft Engine 300hp built by Tom Schmidt, and it is paired with a brand new new 72" NGQ Sensenich Propeller. Fuel and oil lines along with the push pull cables were designed and put on at Mako Hose & Rubber. Single front and rear seats with matching cushions and rain slips by Outdoor Creative Designs. The entire process has been a labor of love, and I'm grateful for the support of my friends and their dedication to the Gladesmen culture.





The hull of this airboat is constructed using 6061-T6 Aluminum Sheet and aluminum T-bar  $2 \times 2 \times 1/4$  inches. It is heavily riveted, and the bottom surface is coated with black Polymer using old-school steel flex technology. The seat structure is made of aluminum with air ride functionality, and there are fiberglass seat shells with conduit guards, a steel motor stand is included in the construction.

My dad "Bishop Sr." built a single airfoil rubber using his own templates. This custom-made rubber hold special value and sentimental meaning. I can certainly appreciate the sentiment behind my dad's creation. It's fantastic that I have something so distinctive and cherishable, and I hope it brings me joy of the memory working with him on this project for years to come.

The project began in June of 2020 when the previous airboat, which was built in 1997, started showing signs of wear and tear. Instead of rebuilding it for the third time, so I decided to start from scratch. Disassembled the old boat, salvaged the usable parts, and used them to create this new airboat.

The Gladesmen culture is a unique and cherished part of American heritage, particularly in the Florida Everglades region. Gladesmen are known for their deep connection to the natural environment and their self-reliant way of life. The tradition of American craftsmanship and

Palm Beach style boats are specially designed to navigate the shallow waters and marshy terrain of the Everglades. They typically feature a flat bottom and rounded sides, allowing them to glide through the water and vegetation with ease. These boats have become an iconic symbol of the Gladesmen culture and are essential for their way of life, enabling them to explore, hunt, fish, and navigate the unique ecosystem of the Everglades.





The sense of community and mutual support among Gladesmen is a core aspect of their culture. They come together to help each other with various tasks, whether it's repairing boats, sharing knowledge and techniques, or assisting during challenging situations in the wilderness. This camaraderie allows them to preserve their way of life and ensure that future generations can also experience and appreciate the Gladesmen culture.

For those who embrace the Gladesmen lifestyle, it becomes an integral part of their identity. It represents a deep connection to nature, self-sufficiency, and a sense of belonging to a tight-knit community. A old friend of mine, Frank Dienager, who is a true Gladesmen, shared some wisdom with me about the airboat community. He mentioned that the problem arose when people started building airboats for profit, rather than as a hobby in their own yards. According to him, this shift in motivation led to a lack of understanding and appreciation for the Gladesmen culture. I agree with this sentiment, as I find it true in many aspects of Air boating today.

Overall my friend and family have poured a lot of effort, time, and dedication into this Airboat rebuild, and Caroll and I are grateful for the support of your friends throughout the process.

## **Bishop's Gator Fritters Recipe**

Here's a recipe for Gator Fritters using Uncle Buck's Hush Puppy Mix and Uncle Buck's Cornbread Mix: (purchased from Bass Pro Shops)
Ingredients:

- 1 container of Uncle Buck's Hush Puppy Mix
- 1 container of Uncle Buck's Cornbread Mix
- 1 pound of ground gator meat
- 3 zucchini squash, chopped
- 3 yellow squash, chopped
- Everglades seasoning (or seasoning of your choice)
- Vegetable oil for frying

#### **Instructions:**

- 1. In a large bowl, combine the Uncle Buck's Hush Puppy Mix and Uncle Buck's Cornbread Mix in equal parts, following the instructions on the packages. This should give you a 50-50 mix.
- 2. Cook the ground gator meat in a skillet over medium heat until thoroughly cooked. Drain any excess grease from the meat.
- **3.** Season the cooked gator meat with Everglades seasoning or any seasoning of your choice. Mix well to coat the meat evenly.
- 4. Add the chopped zucchini squash and yellow squash to the bowl with the hush puppy and cornbread mix.
- 5. Add the seasoned gator meat to the bowl as well. Mix all the ingredients together until well combined.
- 6. Place the mixture in the refrigerator and let it chill for at least one hour. Chilling the mixture helps it hold together better when frying.
- 7. After chilling, heat vegetable oil in a deep skillet or pot for frying. Make sure there is enough oil to fully submerge the fritters.
- 8. Use a spoon or an ice cream scoop to portion out the chilled mixture into small balls or patties.
- 9. Carefully drop the fritters into the hot oil and fry them until they turn golden brown and crispy. This should take about 3-4 minutes per batch.
- 10. Once cooked, remove the fritters from the oil and place them on a paper towel-lined plate to drain any excess oil.
- 11. Serve the gator fritters hot as an appetizer or main dish. They can be enjoyed plain or with a dipping sauce of your choice.

Note: Be cautious when working with hot oil and frying. Make sure to follow safety guidelines and use proper equipment.
